irius College was first established in 1997 with only 28 students by a non-profitable organisation called "Selimiye Foundation Ltd.", in the north-western region of Melbourne, Australia. Sirius College is a non-denominational school which welcomes students from all backgrounds, regardless of race, colour, belief, culture or gender and caters for students from more than 70 different ethnic and religious backgrounds.

Since its first operation, Sirius College has grown beyond expectations to meet the tremendous demand of the community and has managed to reach over 2300 student enrolments across 5 campuses in 2015. This was made possible by the full support of the community and their abiding concern and generosity.

Sirius College is proud of its reputation as having the highest university offers in the North Western suburbs, remarkably, since its first graduates.

In January 2013, the school name was changed from 'ISIK College' to 'Sirius College'. The name change came into effect after lengthy discussions about the image of the school which had gradually became more diverse over the years. Sirius is the brightest star in the sky and it has been used as a symbol of illumination and light by many cultures in history.

Today, Sirius College plays a leading role in educating young generations with its academic excellence and disciplined education; and continues to contribute to the future of Australia.

OUR HISTORY

he Governing Authority of Sirius College is the Selimiye Foundation Pty Ltd. In 1997, the Selimiye Foundation acquired Eastmeadows Primary School following its closure by the Victorian State Government, and established an Independent School named ISIK College.

Eastmeadows Campus commenced its operation in 1997 and offers a Prep to year 12 education program. Eastmeadows Campus is currently sectioned as Primary (Coed) and Secondary (Girls only).

Meadow Fair Campus commenced its operation in 2005 as Upfield Campus and was relocated to its current site in mid 2010. It offers a year 7-12 educational program. (Boys Only)

Keysborough Campus commenced its operation in 2001 and offers a co-educational program for years Foundation-Year 12

Shepparton Campus commenced its operation in 2005 and offers a coeducational program for years Foundation-Year 10

Ibrahim Dellal Campus in Sunshine commenced its operation in 2010 and offers a co-educational program for vears Foundation-Year 9.

Dallas Campus commenced its operation in 2015 and accommodates Grade 6's only.

The number of enrolments at SIRIUS College has increased from 28 students in 1997 to over 2500 students across all campuses in 2015.

World Tours

ith World Tours continue to be a highlight for year 12 students who complete their studies at Sirius College. The travel program promotes cultural awareness and understanding of the world around them. Students are also given the opportunity to particulate in humanitarian activities. The itinerary includes stopovers in several countries and major cities.

To promote our relationship and understanding of our neighbours' year 10 students are given the opportunity to participate in an Asia trip. Students visit various Asian countries which allow them to be immersed in the sights, sounds, smells and tastes of Asia.

Student, school and parent communication

o improve student, staff and parent communication Sirius College introduced to a highly comprehensive, powerful and easy-to-use teaching and learning management platform called SEQTA.

Through a combination of digital teaching and learning practices and improved accessibility for parents within the SEQTA online ecosystem, parents are provided an access to their child's assessment calendar and more important instantaneous access to their child assessment results. We also use online system to receive consent from parent(s)/legal custodian(s) for activities including Excursions, Incursions, Camps, and Pastoral Care Programs as well as counselling services. Parents receive SMS/email messages to learn about the activity and simply respond it.

eysborough campus took part in a research program designed by Deakin University. The program was as 12 month program to promote physical activity in primary aged students. It assisted teachers to design their lessons which included some physical activity such as Go Noodle to ensure students are not sedentary for lengthy periods of time. Students and teachers actively took part in the program which was a success.

ISPrO

wo Year 9 students, Elham Shiday, and Olla Al Sabaari, were chosen as finalist for the ISPrO Indonesian International Science Fair Competition, and were invited to present their projects for judging. They flew to Bogor Indonesia for a week in April 2015 with Mrs Figen Yavuz and enjoyed many science, technology, cultural and sight-seeing activities.

Elham's project titled "Investigating Safe Temperatures and Cooking Method for Cooking Chicken", and Olla's project titled "Are natural Anti-bacterial products more effective than the commercial anti-bacterial products at killing bacteria?" both won Bronze awards at ISPrO, which is a wonderful effort from their work in Year 8.

Individual Learning Plans

e assess our students to carefully design and implement an Individual Learning Plan. The ILP is monitored very carefully by teacher, parent, coordinator and school counsellor. Each child is catered for with short term and long term goals within Literacy and Numeracy. We refer to the ILP's termly and make changes and adjustments with parent knowledge. The classroom teacher, coordinator and counsellor have regular meetings with the parents to discuss improvements to the child's learning.

Anti-Bullying Week

e celebrate, educate and inform all students and parents in regards to 'Anti Bullying' we spend a week to engage students to be part of our positive and friendly school approach. We have our students leading certain activities (Example Foundation and grade 1 students will work on a particular friendship activity with the grade 6's leading the lesson)

We have our guest speaker Mr Oscar Yildiz to present current and factual information to our parents about the effects of Bullying. We aim to educate our parents about how to identify if there child is being bullied or if they are a bully. Mr Yildiz also presents a P.D to our teachers. We recognize and learn about the effects of Cyber Bullying. Our students have an opportunity to engage in various activities that allow them to explore the dangers of cyber bullying and how to protect themselves.

Positive Parenting

he Student Support Services team provided and promoted a positive parenting program. The 4 week workshops took place every Wednesday morning in March. The sessions were facilitated by Ms Belinda Davies from the Broadmeadows Women's Community House. The learning intention for the program was to support confident parenting by encouraging emotional resilience, managing difficult feelings positively, assertive language that motivates without using bribes, discussions and ideas about parenting between cultures.

Sporting School

he Australian Government's Sporting Schools funding allowed our students further opportunities to participate in sports activities before and after school hours. The outreach project allowed for community sports coaches to join kids on campus to develop skills and a love of all sports. Both basketball and soccer proved to be a favourite, even during before school sessions.

Humanitarian Campaign

irius College students engage in multiple humanitarian campaigns. Students not only actively raise donations for orphanages, schools and families in need, but also visit the countries where these donations are distributed. Most recently, year 11 students visited Thailand and Vietnam for a Ramadan dinner and food pack campaign. During this humanitarian trip, students distributed food packs to hundreds of families who are well below the poverty line.

In addition to these, students visited three different orphanages where they distributed food packs, money donations, and gifts to hundreds of orphans. Sirius College students are in communication with all three orphanages with hopes of future charity and support projects.

CREST





Analysis based on year level


Sirius College av erage in all areas except Reading and Numeracy is well above the national average. Those two areas are almost just above the average.




Sirius College average in Reading is below the national average in this year level. But other areas are the same or above the national average.



Sirius College average in Reading is just below, but other areas are the same or above the national average in this year level.






















ATAR Scores

SIRIUS COLLEGE 2015 DESTINATION DATA









MEADOW FAIR CAMPUS TERTIARY ENROLMENT DISTRIBUTION








